JUNE 1926

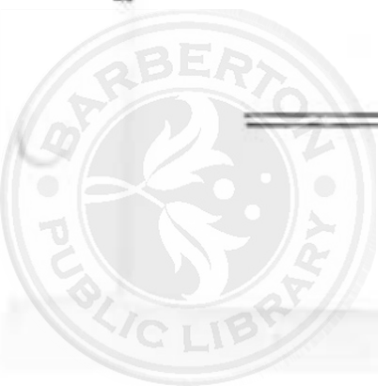
June third is on the harbor

Glancing at the front page I received the shock of the day.

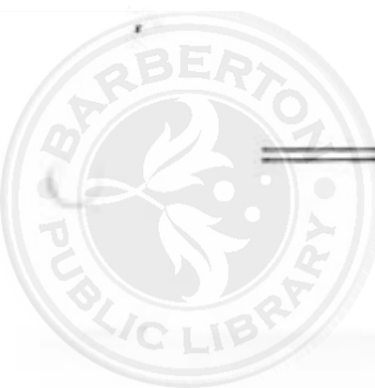
"Royalty has married.

My head gave a quick jerk; really I was nodding, but I would surely enter the land of dreams and romance.

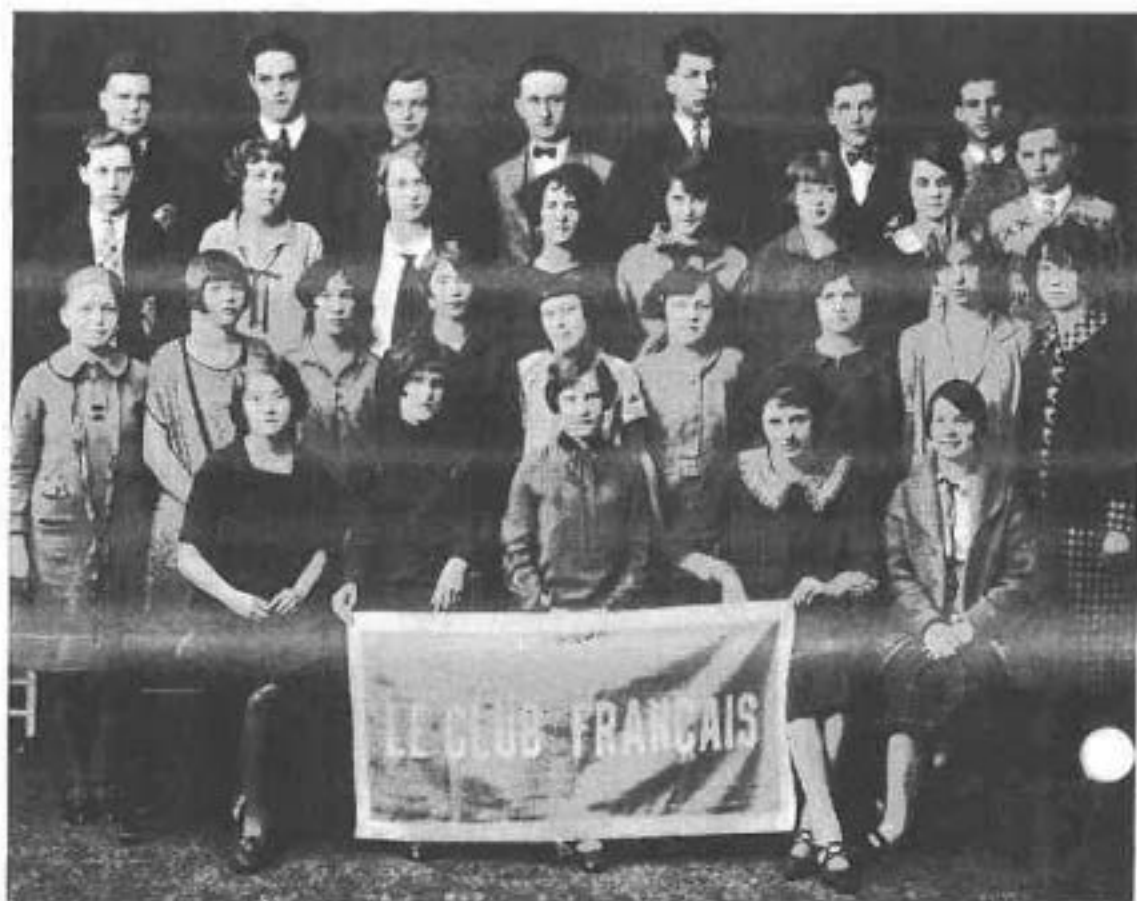

Our next victim was the Columbia Chemical, February 26th. The first half of the game the high school team held them to 16-16 score but, at the end the game stood 25-19.

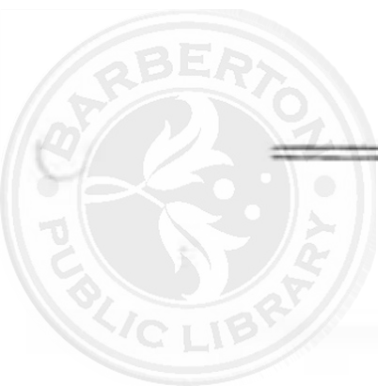
The Oberlin game was our last game before the tournament, played Saturday, February 27th, and the local team lost 35-25. The second team played almost all the game.

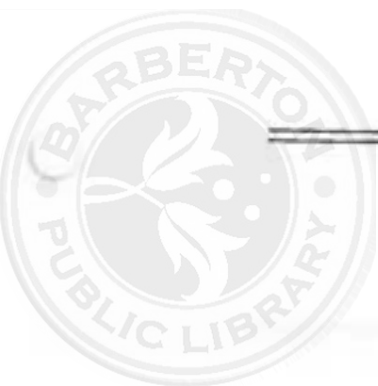
